WE DAT . . . the LDA!

WHO DAT?? That is certainly a phrase that has been heard quite a lot lately, not only in South Louisiana, but throughout the state and actually throughout the country. The Saints have certainly given us a lot to be proud of; however, the question Who Dat in this article refers to something different. Who Dat provides multiple continuing education opportunities in the form of the Alpine Lecture Series, the Summer Education Conference, the Annual Session and New Orleans Dental conference. the Last Chance Seminar and, in the near future, the CCCE (Caribbean Cruise Continuing Education)? Who Dat provides group health insurance, liability insurance, malpractice insurance and disability insurance? Who Dat works tireless hours protecting our interests? Who Dat lobbies the legislature on our behalf? Who Dat stays current on issues relevant to our individual practices and dentistry as a whole? Who Dat works for you in all of these ways? WE DAT...the LDA!

WHAT DAT? What are some of the issues the LDA has been addressing this year?

Access-to-care seems to be the new buzz phrase that is being bandied about these days. In fact you may have seen that the recently released report from the Pew Center on the States, *The Cost of Delay:* State Dental Policies Fail One in Five Children, gave Louisiana an "F" in addressing children's dental needs. The report sheds light on several critical dental care issues and anyone who reads this report will find it troubling, as did we, even though it does acknowledge some progress made in recent years and confirms the value of our present initiatives. We were graded on eight benchmarks and unfortunately only two of the eight were complete.

A lot of things are being done or at least contemplated in the name of access, some of them good, some not so good. First, the good, which is the level of our Medicaid fees in Louisiana. According to The Pew Report, the reimbursement to

dental Medicaid providers is over 70% of the median retail fees. It is currently about 65% of the 2008 NDAS Fee Survey and we will continue to strive to reach our goal of the 70th percentile. This is due entirely to lobbying efforts of the LDA. For nearly 10 years we have been steadily getting increases in the fees. It is a slow process, but we have built a strong alliance with the Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) along the way. The relationship that we have with DHH is invaluable and they know that the LDA has the best interest of the public in mind whenever we make a recommendation.

The LDA, through the efforts of their Access-to-Care Task Force is in the process of implementing a pilot program in Jefferson Parish schools, where the children are screened and those identified as having dental disease are referred to a dental office for treatment. The LDA believes that the dental office is still the optimum place for treatment. Similar programs will soon get underway in Lafayette and in Baton Rouge.

The Louisiana Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH) will be working closely with the LDA in the very near future on a new program to increase access to underserved children. Like I mentioned previously, DHH and the LDA have a great relationship and this spirit of cooperation will go a long way in solving some of the problems.

We also continue to work toward community water fluoridation. The percentage of the population with fluoridated water is still below the national average. The LDA was successful in 2008 in passing legislation to help communities with over 5,000 connections fluoridate their water systems. This past year our main thrust was to be the implementation of this fluoridation initiative. However, due to the school-based dentistry issue, our attention was side-tracked from fluoridation (an update on school-based dentistry coming so stay tuned). The LDA will be working with several communities in the coming

year to make fluoridation available to more Louisiana families. Fluoridation has been shown to be one of the most cost effective ways to prevent caries in the general population. We owe it to the citizens of the Who Dat Nation to provide the means to cut their risk of caries significantly.

I mentioned that some of the proposed solutions to the access problem are not so good. Another term which seems to be gaining popularity is the "mid-level provider." This proposed provider would be a person who may or may not have a college education, they would have a short course (most are about 18 months) on drilling, filling and extracting teeth. What is that you say? You mean that I could have saved approximately six and a half years of school and still practice dentistry? You betcha! Preposterous? The LDA thinks so. You may remember that this started in Alaska with the Dental Health Aide Therapists (DHATs) to treat the Eskimos because allegedly you could not get dentists to go in and treat them. A number of people warned that this would spread to the lower 48 states. Sure enough, they were right.

Minnesota now has provisions for a mid-level provider in their state. Maine is right behind them. A number of other states are also looking at this as a way to solve the access-to-care problem. I was told that Louisiana has a shortage of dentists at a recent LDA Board meeting. I politely disagreed and explained that what we have is a maldistribution of dentists. Dental practices have a high overhead and economics dictates where a dentist will practice their profession. Mid-level providers would be faced with the same economic pressure and they would be practicing in the same areas that fully trained dentists practice. I stated during my speech at last year's House of Delegates that dentistry should be done by dentists. Just because someone is economically disadvantaged or lives on a reservation does not mean that they should receive second-class dental treatment from someone with marginal training. The LDA has helped sponsor legislation in the past to help and continues to seek ways to help dentists with economic incentives to practice in rural areas. The LDA, along with some other like-minded states, is currently working to keep mid-level providers out of

I told you earlier to stay tuned for an update on school-based dentistry. Although the LDA feels that the optimum place to receive dental treatment is in a dental office, we do realize that there may be some people for whom this is not possible. This is where school-based dentistry comes in. However, for this type of dentistry to be safe and truly help with access-to-care, we feel that two things need to happen. First, the schools where the treatment is being done should be in rural areas where there truly is a shortage and not in large metropolitan areas where there are many dentists already available to treat these children. Secondly, for safety's sake, there needs to be parental involvement. A parent or guardian should be available, even if just by phone, to ascertain the accuracy of the health history and to make sure that the parent understands the treatment their child is about to receive. However, the Louisiana State Board of Dentistry, with the exception of a few members, feels that access should not be impeded in any way and no parental involvement is needed. The argument is that the phone call is too onerous a requirement for the mobile dentist and besides nothing bad has happened yet, so things must be OK.

The Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) who truly practice in rural areas and do some school-based dentistry have phone conversations with the parent or guardian. They will tell you that it is hard to get in touch with some of these parents, but they do it. I guess we just need things to be easy and, besides, it is in the name of access, right?

By now you may be wondering not WHO DAT, but HOW DAT? The answer is YOU DAT!! You the members are the LDA! You make us strong and we appreciate that. Together we can keep our profession safe from those who would like to turn it into a trade, similar to the barbershop days. We need your help. We need your participation. Take advantage of the great opportunities that we offer, especially the Annual Session and New Orleans Dental Conference in April. Come to Dentists' Day at the Legislature and make your voice heard. When you pay your dues, don't forget LADPAC.

Since this is my last letter to you, I want to thank you all for allowing me the privilege to serve as your president. It has allowed me the opportunity to see old friends and to make new ones. I have enjoyed working with many of you and dentistry in this state is better because of you. Finally, I do not want to miss the opportunity to thank the wonderful staff at the LDA who made my job easy, who kept me on track and had the difficult job of making me look good. Of course, my wonderful wife, Anne, deserves my thanks and my love for putting up with me and the countless meetings this year. Au revoir mes amis!

Children's Dental Health - FIRST Educate the PARENT

This past week a six-year-old patient and his Dad were in my operatory for their six-month recall hygiene visit. My six-year-old patient had occlusal decay present per his dental exam. I launched into my foods that cause cavities litany: soft drinks, diet soft drinks, mints, gum, hard candies, jellied candies, coffee and tea with sugar, apple juice, sport drinks, lemonade...followed by "Are any of these foods that you consume?" Dad's immediate response for his son was "All of them."

Parents purchase the foods their children consume. Parents must be educated about the effects of their child's diet on his/her dental health. We need to

recommend dietary options to our patients, such as sugar free gum and mints, especially those with xylitol or recaldent. Fresh fruit, carrot sticks with dip and popcorn are among the "good tooth foods."

When your patient is in the dental chair, this is the ideal time to teach children and their parents since you literally have a captive audience. Show the parent and the child where dental plaque is present in the mouth. Show them the plaque on the scaler. Teach them how to floss and brush to most effectively remove dental plaque. Optimal children's dental health is achieved when dental professionals educate the parent AND the child.

Outreach: Choice or Responsibility?

About 75 percent of all dentists maintain solo practices. As dentists, we tend to be independent, disciplined, detailed and self-reliant. All too often, we get into routines that include our families, friends and office personnel. Routines are important in that they provide much needed structure in our lives. But sometimes, the best thing we can do is to get out of our routines, to make the deliberate effort of reaching out to our larger communities and to expand our comfort zones. It's a great way to recommit to the ideals of dentistry. I'd like to tell you about a few of the people who are making this deliberate effort.

Let's begin by applauding the 157 dentists, students and hygienists who provided free health care for 983 school children in Louisiana during this year's Give Kids A Smile Day on February 5. Nationally, it is estimated that about 13,000 dentists participated in this wonderful event, which grows larger every year.

Next year's Give Kids A Smile Day will be on February 4, 2011. I urge you to open your hearts and participate in an activity that is of tremendous importance to the children in your community who do not have access to dental care. Reaching out to underserved populations is a year-round challenge with a lifelong benefit. Research has shown that students who participate in community outreach are more likely to adhere to the highest ethical standards in dentistry and hold closely dentistry's service mission.

Five years ago, Nick Rauber graduated from LSUSD. Today he has a thriving practice in Baton Rouge. While he was a student, he took the lead in starting outreach for adults with developmental disabilities living at the Magnolia School in New Orleans. Nick's sister lives at Magnolia. Today, that caring continues under Karen Oertling, a member of the faculty in our dental hygiene





program. Her son also is a resident at Magnolia. Under her professional and loving supervision, second-year hygiene students regularly monitor the unique needs of the Magnolia residents.

I also want to introduce you to one of our current dental students, Raj Diwan. Last September, he sent out an e-mail to our 325 dental and hygiene students asking if they would like to volunteer in community health events. Within hours, he received replies from 107 saying YES! Since that time, Raj started a student organization called "Making Impressions." They work hard and collaborate with everyone. He and the other students have served at the Special Olympics, church fairs, clinics for the homeless, residential programs for the AIDS population and health fairs in suburban areas. Raj estimates that the students have helped at least 1,000 people.

That's a big number but the important number to remember is one. Each one of us in the dental community can have a big impact on the life of one child or one adult by going beyond our boundaries. Outreach can reconnect us to the best part of our human nature and remind us why we became dentists.

Louisiana Dentists Continue Their Goal of Giving Kids A Smile

Many LDA members volunteered their time this February in support of the American Dental Association's National Children's Dental Health Month. From giving educational presentations at

schools to participating in the February 5, Give Kids A Smile Day events, dentists around the state gave close to 6,000 children something to smile about. (Numbers reported to the LDA by our members.)

For instance, East Baton Rouge Parish dentists worked with Health Care Centers in Schools to bus children to participating dental offices to receive screenings, cleanings, fluoride and, in some cases, sealants. At some locations. like the LSU Dental School, the children were also given presentations to teach them how to brush correctly and explain why taking care of their mouth is important. Children also participated in hygiene "games" while waiting to be screened, in the hope of teaching the children what foods are good for healthy teeth. Several components do similar events, including Northwest, Northeast and NODA. The Northwest component hosts their event


with the students at the Southern University at Shreveport Metro Center (dental hygiene clinic).

For many of the children, GKAS was their first trip to a dental office. This provided our members


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



PEW Report Worth Heeding for Several Reasons

In late February, the Pew Center on the States released a report titled *The Cost of Delay: State Dental Policies Fail One in Five Children*. The report set benchmarks for eight criteria intended to measure how well government policies in each state foster access to dental care for children. It then assessed each state on those criteria and assigned each state a letter grade based on how many benchmarks were attained. Louisiana was given an "F" for only attaining 2 out of 8 benchmarks.

As the largest organization for dental professionals in the state representing 80 percent of Louisiana's active licensed dentists, the LDA was obliged to comment on the PEW Report. Basically, the LDA's response attempted to make the most of the attention and clarity the report could bring to the LDA's longstanding fight to improve oral health care for our children. Accordingly, the LDA response emphasized how the report validated the merits of our present initiatives.

For instance, the report applauded the passage in 2008 of a law mandating that local water systems with 5,000 service connections or more provide customers with optimally-fluoridated water once funding becomes available. However, the report then criticized the State for failing to fund the mandate due to budget shortfalls. We tend to agree with PEW and contend that the lack of funding for fluoridation stymies full implementation of one of the most cost-effective public health measures there is. Studies in Louisiana show every \$1 spent on community water fluoridation leads to roughly \$38 in taxpayer savings.

According to the state Department of Health and Hospitals (DHH), only about 40% of Louisiana's population receives optimally fluoridated water. The national average is nearly 70%, and the federal "Healthy People 2010" goal is 75%.

Likewise, the PEW Report acknowledged Louisiana's progress in the past decade increasing dental Medicaid reimbursement rates in order to increase dentist participation in the program. So, the LDA pointed out that recent cuts to Medicaid and the even more severe cuts that may loom ahead threaten to erase the substantial progress made to date.

While the PEW Report makes clear that, as a state, Louisiana has lots of room for improvement of children's oral health care, the report may not be the best measure for determining where we stand.

For one thing, Louisiana probably would have received a higher grade if better data had been available. For example, Louisiana apparently did not score well on one criterion in the report, "tracks data on children's dental health," because of the format and timing of the State's data submission, not because the State does no tracking. Similarly, the figures in the report for "share of Medicaid-enrolled children getting dental care" were more than two years out of date, and showed Louisiana falling several points short of the benchmark national average of 38.1%. Yet, the latest figures from DHH indicate that utilization in Louisiana has climbed to 38.3%.

Finally, there are several criteria used in the report that are of dubious value for evaluating *actual* access to care, as opposed to the enactment of policies *intended* to increase access.

For example, the effect on access to care of "hygienists can place sealants without dentist's prior exam" is at best unclear. There appears to be no hard evidence that there are signifi-cantly more hygienists with available time who could place many more sealants but for a lack of dentists to perform exams. Nor is it clear that it's impractical to solve this problem by finding more dentists to conduct the exams. And, if hygienists were to place sealants without a prior exam by a dentist, it's possible some children would receive them when an exam would have revealed the condition of their teeth contraindicated sealants. Similarly, PEW gives credit to states that "authorize new primary care [i.e., mid-level] dental providers" despite a lack of compelling data indicating such providers are not any more likely than dentists to locate in underserved areas. In fact, the experience in states with independent or collaborative hygiene practice suggests exactly the opposite is likely.

Finally, the report neglects to acknowledge such initiatives by the state, LDA and other health care organizations as the Louisiana's Rural Scholars Program and tax incentives to encourage more dentists to practice in rural areas, or the LDA's Dental Home pilot program that is designed to establish ongoing relationships with dentists and Medicaid-eligible children at an early age.

So, the PEW Report is both an opportunity to bolster support for LDA efforts to increase access and a warning to watch carefully for those whose agendas include access proposals that seem beneficial, but could actually serve to funnel money away from more effective initiatives. By keeping informed and involved, you can help the LDA succeed on both counts.

I want to continue to keep our committees active and strong. We need to pursue the objectives that our long-range

strategic plan set out for us to accomplish over the next three to five years.

Continue to improve our position we took at last year's House of Delegates concerning mobile dentistry. There was a lot of confusion and uncertainty about the resolution that eventually became legislation that went to the state legislature. I believe it was important that we brought the issue up for discussion and acted on it. In retrospect, we could have handled the resolution much differently, however, it is now out there and we will move forward with it and work with our members for the good of the community.

What in your opinion, are the most critical issues facing dentists right now, and how would you like the LDA to respond to these issues? Dentistry is becoming increasingly diverse, and we must be aware of the needs of new member dentists, along with the technology dental students learn throughout their education. "DOING THE RIGHT THING" when it comes to ethics and professionalism are important aspects of the profession. There will always be a concern with how standardization will apply to reduction of errors, increased safety, and confidentiality in health care delivery.

Second, we will have to closely evolve with the younger dentist population and the standards they are trained with (internet communications, online education, podcasts, etc.) These are great technology trends, however running a dental office will have some basic issues that will never change, that being challenges of overhead control, health care reform and what level of technology you implement into your office. There will be a balance of combining good basic dental care with how much technology fits into your particular comfort zone. The complexity of that technology will vary broadly from office-to-office. And, as my final comment, let us all focus on why we are here in the first place - to provide our patients the care and attention that they entrust to us.

To Convert or Not to Convert: That is the IRA Question The New Roth IRA Conversion Opportunity

The Roth IRA conversion opportunity is finally here for people making over \$100,000. In 2009 (and prior), only families with adjusted gross incomes under \$100,000 were permitted to convert a Traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, but beginning this year, new tax rules take effect and all individuals are eligible to make this conversion. The catch is that you must pay the taxes now on the converted amount (at your current income tax bracket).

The Roth IRA provides investors the opportunity to put away after-tax dollars and collect growth on these funds. As long as the investor is over age 59 ½ and has held the Roth account for at least five years, the funds, including earnings, can even be withdrawn tax-free. So the question for this year is to convert or not to convert? Let's look at three key issues to address before deciding: 1.) How will you use this money? 2.) How will you pay the taxes? 3.) The "do over" and how it works.

How Will You Use this Money?

This question is crucial and should always be considered before deciding to convert any part of an existing Traditional IRA. Those in retirement or close to retirement that expect to have decreasing tax brackets and will be living off of the IRA money should not convert. If you are many years from retirement and you expect to be paying more taxes once in retirement, then the conversion might be a good idea. If you do not plan on using the IRA money during retirement and want to pass it on to the next generation then converting to a Roth IRA looks extremely attractive. Assets held in a Traditional IRA must start being distributed when the holder turns age 70 ½, however, no such lifetime distribution rules apply to a Roth IRA. This could be an excellent way to pass on part of your estate to the next generation tax-free, truly stretching your IRA for generations. Imagine giving a tax-free investment to your grandkids to grow for years and years. But keep in mind the Roth IRA is still included in estate tax calculations.

How Will You Pay the Taxes?

Those planning to convert should pay the taxes from outside the IRA. Do not beat down an IRA 25% to 35%

in order to pay the taxes for the conversion. If the IRA is large consider converting only part of the Traditional IRA to a Roth IRA in 2010. The owner will have to pay income tax on the previously untaxed value of the converted IRA. This can either be done in full in 2010 or the holder can choose to include half the conversion amount in taxable income in 2011 and half in 2012. Amounts converted after 2010 are subject to tax fully in the year of conversion. Keep in mind that if you are currently in a high tax bracket, your income taxes will most likely be higher in 2012, so it is probably in your best interest to pay all of the taxes in 2011.

The "Do Over"

Few times in life can you get a "do over," but the Roth conversion is one of them. After converting a Traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, you have up until the filing extensions after taxes are due the following year to change your mind and convert back to the Traditional IRA. For example, let's say you converted a \$100,000 IRA to a Roth and the market value went down to \$80,000 by the time you were going to file your taxes. Instead of paying \$30,000 in taxes, you could convert back to the Traditional IRA and negate the taxes. Then you can re-convert back to the Roth in the next calendar year, hopefully at a lower cost or conversion basis.

Consider all three of these concerns before making a decision on whether to convert your Traditional IRAs or not. Consult your financial planner, as well as your CPA before any decision is made.

eamonte Driver died on February 25, 2007, at the age of 12 years. While the untimely death of any child is tragic, what was particularly disturbing in this instance was the cause of his death. He died from a severe brain infection that started with an abscessed tooth, according to the Washington Post. Deamonte was a member of an underserved segment of our population - poor, Medicaid eligible individuals. This is an extreme example of what former Surgeon General David Satcher called a "silent epidemic" of untreated oral disease, in his landmark report on oral health in 2000. It is a national disgrace that in 21st century America, millions of children do not receive basic preventive and restorative dental care. Many reasons are cited for this: lack of funds, lack of insurance, unavailability of dentists, lack of parental concern, unavailable transportation, etc.

In Louisiana, only 32% of Medicaid eligible children received any dental services at all in 2008. This translates into an astonishing 510,000 eligible children who received no dental care.¹ The unmet need for dental services in this population is staggering. A recent study revealed 42% of Louisiana third-grade students had untreated cavities and in some rural parishes the incidence was as high as 55%. Approximately 38% of Louisiana dentists are "active" providers (meaning they have received at least one paid visit in the last six months) in the Medicaid program.² The percentage of Louisiana dentists who actually see a significant number of Medicaid patients is probably much less than 38%

The LDA is to be commended for their efforts to address obstacles to care. The Medicaid Task Force headed by "Don" Donaldson was successful in increasing the Medicaid reimbursement rate to the 65th percentile of the NDAS Fee Survey in an effort to encourage more dentist participation. (Unfortunately, emergency legislation effective January 22, 2010, decreased reimbursement rates.) Legislation that mandates fluoridation for community water systems will help control caries, the most prevalent – and preventable – childhood disease. The Give Kids A Smile program is helping bring dental services to those children in need. The federal government is addressing the access problem through FQHCs (federally qualified health clinics). Efforts by individual dentists to

provide dental treatment in schools has greatly enhanced access to care for children unable to receive treatment at a brick and mortar dental office. Unfortunately, the mobile/portable dentistry issue has also generated a great deal of controversy.

In recent years, no issue that has come before the Board has generated more interest and controversy. Although rules governing mobile dentistry had been in place for several years, the legislature has directed us to revisit this topic. We have received input from individual dentists, LDA representatives, school principals, school nurses, teachers, lobbyists, representatives of FQHCs, the Department of Health and Hospitals and, most recently, the Federal Trade Commission. We have reviewed legislation that other states have enacted to address this subject and we have revised and re-revised our pre-existing rules.

One of the main points of contention involves the manner in which parental involvement/informed consent should be handled. Few would argue that ideal dental care is best achieved with a long-term relationship in a "dental home", beginning early in life with close parental guidance. Unfortunately, for far too many children, this scenario will never be realized. The parental involvement and dental care that you and I experienced does not exist for a large segment of our population. For many children, it comes down to school-based and/or mobile dental care or no dental care at all.

The Louisiana State Board of Dentistry exists for the sole purpose of protecting the interests of our citizens. When considering this issue we must ask ourselves, "What is best for the children?" I can assure you, we will act in the best interests of the children.

God bless the children, for in this world they have no choice, they have no voice – but we have a choice, and we are their voice.

There's An Ap For That...
